

Though written primarily for a Jewish audience, the book includes material that will enthrall Christians seeking to understand their heritage and the ways in which the New Testament writers interpreted the expectations of the Messiah culminating in Jesus of Nazareth. This book goes beyond the simple explanations so often taught and moves to a detailed explanation of what Christians hold dear in their teaching. All will find commonality in the central assertion with which Rabbi Glickman begins this wonderful book--that expectations of the Messiah mean simply that things will get better than this. Both Jews and Christians will identify with this simple, yet salient insight. This is a wonderful book.
